Green Team Bulky Bins are scheduled to be on site from **Monday, May 13** through **Wednesday May 15**. Their arrival time on Monday is between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m.—please be patient as we do not have a specific delivery time guarantee. They will be located in the Cribari East and West parking lots, the Montgomery Center parking lot and the Foothill Center parking lot.



The following items are NOT allowed in these bulky bins: No concrete, dirt, tires, engine parts, televisions, computer monitors, refrigerators, freezers, medical or hazardous waste.

Garbage is not allowed inside the bulky bins—no exceptions. Contaminated bulky bins will not be removed from The Villages until all garbage has been removed. Please comply with the above so that we can continue with this free service of bulky bins again.

ABOD President's Message—April 30, 2024

The theme for the 2024 National Volunteer Week was Celebrate Service—an opportunity to shine a light on the people and causes that inspire us to serve. Julia Meadows and her team inspired all of us when she transported 250 of us to Breakfast at Tiffany's for a delicious meal and delightful morning, celebrating all the Villagers who volunteer. Of particular note were the three women who were the first to receive the Villages Legacy of Service Award, Vera M. Buescher, Claudia Evans Nicolai, and Jeanne Filice. I know all three of these ladies personally and they continue to inspire all of us to volunteer, participate and be involved.

Our DAC volunteers had a busy week, attending the All-DAC Budget Review session last Wednesday and the individual meetings with Ryan Bell and Blake Kennedy last Thursday. Overall, the estimated Operating costs are expected to rise approximately ten percent (10%) and Reserve Replacement plans to rise approximately eight percent (8%) for an aggregate of nine percent (9%). While we have one Association budget, each village has its own allotment based on the projects and needs of that village. This means proposed individual villages' assessments will rise between two percent (2%) and nineteen percent (19%). The major changes in Operating costs are insurance, which will likely rise almost twenty-five percent (25%) and a restructuring of our budget process, which moved some expenses from Reserves to Operating. Other major expenses included landscape, utilities, turf reduction and fire hardening. If you look at the detailed report you'll see the landscape contract has gone down but the Landscape Extras have gone up. This is because in order to save money and increase service, irrigation, tree maintenance and major landscape planting have been taken out of the basic contract. In some cases the Villages has hired our own employees for these tasks. In other cases, we intended to put major projects out to bid to get the best price possible. The discussion of these draft budgets and allotments will be a major portion of our meeting today. A huge thank you to Ryan, Blake and Theresa for their many hours beyond their normal work day to get the best estimates to us, for double and triple checking every item and for their amazing collective expertise in all things financial.

I am also very excited about the three people who have volunteered to run for the Association Board for 2025, Patrick Barber, Dave Dimmick and Deb Gordon. I know these Villagers, have worked with them, and have every confidence in their abilities to do the work of the Association on our behalf. Ballots will be delivered in late May. Please return them promptly via US Mail or at the ballot box in the parking lot by Building A.

Finally, a shout-out to David Cook for all his work leading the Insurance Committee. He is home recovering from hip surgery but has done a herculean job in helping board members from all three Boards, ABOD, CBOD and HBOD, learn about the complexities and pitfalls of the current insurance market. I am so grateful he has agreed to continue as chair of our combined Insurance Committee.

Club President's Message—April 30, 2024

Hello, Villagers! Spring is in full swing at The Villages and the pollen count reminds us each day of the lovely trees, plants, flowers, and grasses that surround us on this gorgeous property we call home. The sunny days, reasonable temperatures and fewer rainy days have Villagers emerging from their homes and engaging in several wonderful and enriching activities. There truly is something for everyone at The Villages, and if it doesn't exist, you can create it here!

Hooray! All four swimming pools are now open. The new third bocce court has opened while the benches and overhead covers are still being installed. The first Bocce Boot Camp session has already taken place, plus the first Bocce Bash of the season was held last week. Potential contractors have been identified for the golf course bunker project and they'll be arriving onsite to visit The Villages golf courses prior to submitting their bids to the RFP. Fingers crossed, we may start on the bunker liner replacement project as soon as this fall!

The FY25 budgets have been delivered by our General Manager and her team and are being approved this week for all three corporations. FY25 will be a year where the Club Board and Villages Team continue to upgrade and breathe new life into several existing Club amenities. You've already heard about projects for the swimming pools, the bocce courts, and the golf courses. More and more improvements are being planned for our amenity facilities, with each investment maintaining or improving the amenity experience while also supporting or increasing the value of our homes. Careful multi-year planning is key to keeping The Villages looking fresh and relevant to us, and to new buyers.

The Villages Insurance Committee has continued to find ways to save The Villages money on insurance costs. A great deal of progress has been gained, yet major community-wide decisions and activities will need another one to two years or more to accomplish. The Villages Association's CC&Rs currently require The Villages to be insured for the total replacement cost of all districts—as if every building was destroyed at the same time. Current repair/replacement costs are estimated at \$889 million. This number is expected to rise in 2025 as the next appraisal comes due. The Insurance Committee will continue to research ways to lower overall insurance costs, including reducing the level of insurance required by considering a possible Association CC&Rs spot amendment plus requesting an exemption from the federal mortgage lender insurance requirements. More to come!

Rambler Lite Hike May 22: Katy Peretti (408-531-0917) will lead a hike to Glen Arden and Highlands. We'll walk around Glen Aden then along Caledonia to Buckhaven and back to Foothill. Meet at Foothill at 9 a.m.

Rambler Hike May 29: Bob Bogdanoff (408-834-9657) will lead a hike at the newly opened Mayyan Ooyakma – Coyote Ridge Open Space Preserve. The hike will be a 5.1 mile circular trail which consists of the Serpentine Spring Trail (1.3 miles, elevation change of 1,000 feet), Tule Elk Trail (1.3 miles, elevation change less than 50 feet) and the Bay Checkerspot Trail (2.5 miles, elevation change of 1,000 feet). 





trucks that have been "put out to pasture" are treated with the same care as her human subjects. The theme of uncovering beauty in the mundane while celebrating life's essence with authenticity is the common thread woven into all of her work.

Valuing transdisciplinary art and the various possibilities and outcomes that intersection inspires, Susan experiments with different mediums. She is currently combining her passion for the raw, expressive nature of charcoal with the cultivated structure of printed photographs. She enhances the narrative of her images by tearing or cutting photographs and creating collages that interlace fragments of the print with meticulously rendered photorealistic charcoal drawings.

Most of Susan's work is shown in black and white, inviting a certain intrigue to look deeper, but a bit of her work crosses over to color adding a flair. Take the time to join us May 6 and enjoy Susan's delightful demo and presentation.



Composting helps reduce waste, condition land

The definition of compost is a mixture that consists largely of decayed organic matter and is used for fertilizing and conditioning land.

There are various methods of getting organic matter to become compostable materials. Here in The Villages, several gardeners use large bins that revolve the material for a long period of time to turn organic material such as leaves, plants, grasses, etc. into compost.

Other people here in The Villages use the help of worms that digest the compostable material to get compost.

A few years ago, someone recommended an energy-efficient, electric composter which I use and love. This composter actually has high enough heat to compost my cat’s waste.

Near my sink I have a receptacle in which I put my coffee grinds, fruit and vegetable peelings, eggshells, etc.—most of my organic food waste. Once a week, I go to my backyard which has my electric composter. I first empty the previous week’s organic waste which is now wonderful compost and put it on my garden bed. I then return to the composter and place that week’s food scraps into the composter to do its job. I’ve done this over a year now and the soil in my garden is very fertile from the weekly doses of organic compost.

‘God Chooses Us to Love Others and to Remain in His Love’

When we make the effort to care for another person, no matter his/her ethnicity or our relationship with that person, we experience self-less love that is akin to the love that God has for us. The Scripture readings for the 6th Sunday of Easter reveal that God’s love for all peoples helps us to see that God has chosen us to love others and that God empowers us with the Holy Spirit to love others and thereby remain united with him and be full of God’s joy.

In the First Reading (Acts 10,25-26,34-35,44-48), St. Luke reveals the unbounded nature of God’s love for all peoples. God shows no favoritism. Whoever believes in God and acts uprightly is accepted, revered by God, so much so that the Spirit abides in that person. This shows that being accepted by God is not dependent on one’s nationality or one’s observance of special customs. It’s how one loves that counts!

In the Second Reading (1 John 4:7-10), St. John explains love’s origin (“love is of God”), **how it is revealed** (“God sent his only Son”), and **what it consists of** (“Not that we have loved God, but that God has loved us and sent his Son as expiation for our sins”). True love is God’s self-giving love for us, experienced in God’s sending Jesus to us.

In the Gospel (John 15:9-17), St. John encourages all to remain in God’s love and to be generous in our love for others. God loves us and wants us to remain in his love by keeping his commandment to love one another. When we do that, we not only experience abundant joy, we also become God’s “friends,” which enables us to continue loving others just as Jesus did.

So, let us consciously choose to love others in all places—no matter their race, culture or creed—and thereby demonstrate that *God has chosen us* to be Christ to others and remain united in his love.

‘Teaching Once, Praying Twice’

What favorite hymns form your theology and shape your prayers? It’s been said that those who sing pray twice, and every Sunday school teacher knows that songs teach faith in “sticky” ways. So in a week when the Episcopal Church remembers Elisabeth Cruciger—the first female hymn writer of the Protestant Reformation—let us also give thanks for the ministry of singers and musicians.

Elisabeth, a friend of Martin Luther, had entered monastic life as a young woman. But she became convinced of the teachings of the Protestant Reformation and left the convent for Wittenberg. She would eventually marry Caspar Cruciger, who was a professor of theology. Elisabeth embarked on an active ministry as a hymn writer. According to one account, she once dreamed she was standing in the pulpit of the Wittenberg church preaching. Upon telling this to her pastor husband, he replied that whenever the church sang one of her hymns, she was indeed preaching, just as much as if she had spoken the words from the pulpit.

Elisabeth’s hymn “Lord Christ, God’s Only Dear Son” was translated into English by Miles Coverdale, and became one of the most popular Anglican hymns of the 16th Century. The lyrics reveal her profound Trinitarian theology: “O Father, here before you with God the Holy Ghost, And Jesus we adore you, O pride of angel host: Before you mortals lowly cry: “Holy, holy, holy, O blessed Trinity!”

With Steve as a member, a committee was formed to discuss the feasibility of working with the Tennis Club to allow pickleball play on the tennis courts. The team worked well together to make things happen, but unfortunately that entailed much work on the pickleball side to make the tennis courts work as pickleball courts. Summer Rules—From this pint forward, we will be playing Summer Rules...please play the ball down at all times from tee to green. Let us know if you have any questions.

Tips from the Pro— Dance with the partner you came with...

Does the ball you play match your style of golf? As we all know there are literally thousands of types of golf balls out there to choose from. So how do you know what ball is best for you? Aside from color or brand, look at the playing characteristics of the ball relative to the game you play. For instance, if you like to hit your chip shots low, land them short and roll it to the hole, then you should choose a ball that spins less. But if you like to hit your chip shots high and soft, landing closer to the hole, then you should choose a ball the spins more. If you hit the ball low, and are looking for a higher trajectory, you should hit a ball that spins more...conversely if you hit it too high and are looking to bring your trajectory down a little, you should hit a ball that spins less. If you want to reduce your slice, try a ball that spins less...but if you want to be able to work the ball more in both directions, chose a ball that spins more. If you like to ram your 5-foot putts into the back of the cup, then use a ball that spins less...but if you like to die your ball into the hole, than try a ball that spins more. Balls that spin less usually have 2 layers and are a bit less expensive... some examples are: Wilson DUO, Callaway Super Soft, Srixon Soft Feel, Titleist Tru-Feel, Taylor made Distance, Taylor Made Kalea. Balls that spin more usually have 3-5 layers and are typically a bit more expensive...some examples are: Titleist ProV1, Callaway Chrome Tour or Chrome Soft, Srixon Z-Star Diamond, Taylor Made TP5. For instance, I always used the Titleist ProV1, but now I use the Srixon Z-Star Diamond because I have a narrow downswing, so I spin the ball a lot (sometimes too much) and so I like a high-performance ball that spins less, and the Srixon is great for me. So try some different types of balls until you find the one that matches *your* game perfectly. To sign up for a lesson with me, email ssteele@the-villages.com





Let's Talk Real Estate

2024 Annual Member Meetings and Elections — Update

The three Villages Corporations (Club, Association and Homeowners' Corporation) are preparing for this year's elections and annual membership meetings. Elections will be conducted in May and June with election results announced at this year's annual membership meetings to be held on **Wednesday, June 12, 2024, at 4 p.m.** at The Villages Clubhouse.

Candidates Night: Tuesday, May 7 at 7 p.m. at Cribari Auditorium (Will be recorded to run on Channel 27 beginning May 10).

Ballots: Ballots to be distributed **Friday, May 10.**

Club: The Amended and Restated Bylaws of The Villages Golf and Country Club (VGCC) Corporation state that there shall be seven directors. Directors with terms expiring are Leslie Lambert, Judy Owen, Bob Krattli, and Andy Altman. The directors who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Liz Kung, Larry Versaw, and Richard Zahner.

The VGCC election will be held for four open director positions to serve on the Board of Directors, three director positions to serve three-year terms, and one director position to serve a term of one year. (The one-year term is the final year of a three-year term of a former director that resigned.) The three candidates receiving the largest number of votes shall be elected to serve a term of three years, and the candidate receiving the fourth largest number of votes shall be elected to serve a term of one year.

The Club Nominating Committee has announced Diana Hallock, Judy Owen, Michelle Breslin, and Andy Altman, as its candidate nominations. As of the publishing deadline, for this week's *Villager*, no other candidates have come forward with a self-nomination petition. (Per the Club Bylaws Section 6.1.2, any Member in Good Standing may place his or her name in nomination by filing with the Secretary of the Club (Bob Krattli) a notice of intent signed by at least two percent (51) of the Members in Good Standing. Self-nomination petitions must be received no later than 5 p.m. on May 1, 2024.)

Homeowners: The Bylaws of the Homeowners' Corporation provide that there will be five directors. Those who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Teddy Morse, and Rob Kirschbaum. The directors for which terms expire are Brooks Fuller, Morton Cordell and Glen Seidel, all three are eligible to run again.

The Villages Homeowners' Corporation will conduct a vote on The Villages Homeowners' Corporation Resolution, Excess of Membership Income Over Membership Expenses Refunded to Members and an election to fill three director positions, two for terms of three years, and one for a term of one year. The two candidates receiving the largest number of votes shall be elected to serve a term of three years, and the candidate receiving the third largest number of votes shall be elected to serve a term of one year.

As of the publishing deadline for this week's *Villager*, Morton Cordell, Larry McNary and Glen Seidel are qualified candidates. (Any Member in Good Standing may place his or her name in nomination for election to the Board by giving written notice to the President (Teddy Morse) or Secretary (Morton Cordell) of the Corporation no later than 5 p.m. on May 1, 2024.

Association: For The Villages Association, in addition to the vote The Villages Association Resolution, Excess of Membership Income Over Membership Expenses Refunded to Members, election will be held for three director vacancies for terms of three years each.

The Amended and Restated Bylaws of the Corporation provide that there shall be seven directors. Those who will continue to serve during the ensuing year are Michael Schwerin, Patricia Reardon, John Epperheimer, and Steve Gilbert. As of the duly noticed Deadline of Nominations date of March 26, 2024, and as duly noticed per California Civil Code and The Villages Association Rule 2.25 Voting and Elections Rules, David Dimmick, Deb Gordon, and Patrick Barber are the candidates for this year's director election.
